

A Statement Opposing Female Genital Mutilation

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) is an extremely harmful practice with devastating health consequences for girls and women. Some girls die from blood loss or infection as a direct result of the procedure. Women who have undergone FGM are also likely to experience difficulty in childbirth.

What this statement is for: You should take this statement with you when you go abroad. You can show it to your family. This makes it clear that FGM is a serious **criminal offence** in the UK with a maximum penalty of 14 years in prison for anyone found guilty of the offence.

Keep this statement in your passport, purse or wallet which you carry with you **all the time** - especially when you go abroad.

What is FGM: FGM is the mutilation of the external female genitalia for non-medical reasons. It is also sometimes known as female circumcision or 'sunna'.

UK legislation: FGM is a crime in the UK¹. **Even if someone is taken overseas for the mutilation, it is still a crime in the UK if the mutilation is done by a UK national or permanent UK resident.** It is also a crime if a UK national or permanent resident assists or gets a non-UK national or permanent resident to carry out the acts overseas on a UK national or permanent resident.

¹ In England, Wales and Northern Ireland, the practice is illegal under the Female Genital Mutilation Act 2003. In Scotland it is illegal under the Prohibition of Female Genital Mutilation (Scotland) Act 2005.

Criminal Penalties: Anyone found guilty of an FGM offence - or of aiding and abetting such an offence - faces a penalty of up to 14 years in prison, a fine, or both.

Help and support: If you are in the UK and have concerns that this may happen to you or someone you know, you can speak to a teacher, doctor, school nurse, social worker, police officer or any health, educational or social care professional in confidence. They will be able to help and support you.

If you are in the UK and are concerned that you may be taken overseas for the purpose of FGM please **call the police by dialling 999**.


