St Matthews's Physical Education and Sport Vision Statement 2015-2017

'St Matthew's Primary School believes that Physical Education is an essential part of every child's educational development. Through high quality Physical Education and Sport we aim to provide every child with the opportunity to develop their physical capabilities. A high quality Physical Education curriculum entitles our children to develop their physical literacy as well as teaching them the importance of leading a healthy lifestyle. Cognitive skills such as decision making and analysis and social skills such as teamwork and leadership are also embedded as a result of high quality Physical Education. Providing children with a broad and balanced curriculum enables them to develop their fundamental skills and competence needed to perform at a high level in a wide range of sports and activities. As well as a broad curriculum, St Matthew's also offers children the chance to participate in both intra and inter school competitive sports developing the necessary skills and values needed when participating in games and physical activities'.

Physical Education and Sports Funding for Primary Schools 2015-2017

In March 2013 the government announced that it is to provide additional funding of £150 million per annum to school until the end of 2020 to improve provision of physical education and sport in primary schools. This funding – provided jointly by the Department for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport will be allocated to primary school head teachers/principals.

This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on the provision of physical education and sport in schools. The physical education premium is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of physical education and sport activities they offer to pupils.

Each school will receive £8000 plus an extra £5 per pupil each year. At St Matthew's this means that the school will receive £9035 to improve the provision of physical education and sport. The school will receive the funding in to parts. The first half will be awarded in October with the second being received in April.

The specialist PE teacher employed last year will continue to work alongside staff in delivering the National Curriculum for PE. This includes swimming.

The specialist PE teacher has implemented a strong foundation of extra-curricular activities for all pupils. On average the school offers 10 after schools clubs on a weekly basis. Clubs have included football, multi sports, cricket, tennis, girls' multi sports, dodge ball, handball, gymnastics and netball. As well as the specialist PE teacher delivering after school clubs, we also have a specialist football

coach in 3 days a week coaching all year groups and a Higher Learning Teaching Assistant (HLTA) who specialises in sports coaching delivering 1 day a week.

The Association for Physical Education (AfPE) states that a target for schools after receiving the sports premium should include increasing participation levels in competitive sport. The specialist PE teacher will continue to create strong links with outside sporting agencies and schools in order to provide children with the opportunity to participate in competitive sport. At St Matthew's the year 5 and 6 football team participate in the Aston Schools Football League bi-weekly. In addition to this they have taken part in other football competitions in the Birmingham area with the most current being successful in the under 11's regional schools tournament at Aston Villa. Strong links have also been made with schools around the surrounding area with various sporting competitions taking place at Heartlands Academy, St Clements Primary school and Perry Beaches Academy. Children have also been to Lords cricket ground in London to participate in the 'Chance to Shine' cricket tournament. The Sports Premium alongside the schools PE budget has ensured that all relevant transport costs are made available, allowing children to participate in a wide variety of competitive sporting activities.

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The school will also set aside funds from the sports premium on new equipment. This equipment will enable every child in the school to participate in a wide variety of physical activity opportunities. Better and safer equipment will mean more enjoyable activities for the children to part take in.

The AfPE further indicates that the school sports premium fund should be utilised in relation to the quality of initial teacher training in PE and Sport. To achieve this, the PE specialist will be attending various CPD courses over the next school year. The aim will then be to relay the training back to the generalist teacher to further their understanding in PE. As a result children will be able to experience high quality PE lessons across all year groups.
